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PUBLIC WORSHIP... AS WE CONTINUE TO SHELTER IN PLACE

On Sunday, June 14, 116 excited people lifted up God's name at three different LCPC public worship services. About 170 more worshipped online through our pre-recorded service on YouTube.

Some of you want to know all about what we're doing to prevent the spread of COVID. That information appears below. But here are the basic schedule and key guidelines:

Throughout July and continuing through the summer we'll offer four worship options, all featuring the same readings and message:

- 9:00 AM New Song Contemporary worship in the Sanctuary (music led by our praise band, The Blessed)
- 9:00 AM New Song Contemporary "Al Fresco" worship, a friendly, worshipful simulcast of the New Song service on an 86" screen in the Courtyard
- 11:00 AM Classic worship in the Sanctuary (music led by Gary Woodward, Elzbieta Nawrocka, and our Choral Music Department)
- Online worship posted at 9:00 AM on YouTube and at lcpc.net (pre-recorded, but with the same readings and message as the other three services)

The key guidelines? We're practicing social distancing. We require masks during worship. We encourage hand washing and offer free sanitizer, masks, and gloves. We'll discourage socializing indoors. We don't have a "greeting time" during services or coffee fellowship between services. In the courtyard we require temperature screening.

Spread the word! Tell your friends! Think of people who've had a hard time during the sheltering and the turmoil following the death of George Floyd and invite them to join you in worship!

WHAT CAN I EXPECT AT PUBLIC WORSHIP THROUGH THE SUMMER?

Our planning process for re-opening involved many hours of discussion, research and prayer. Our goals have been: (1) to obey laws and follow sound guidelines provided by various government agencies; (2) to provide choices, especially for those who want or need a high level of safety; and (3) to set a high standard of excellence for all services.

What does a "reasonable" level of safety looks like? As we worked through the issues we realized: it looks different to different people. Some have health challenges or live with people with health challenges that require them to exercise extreme caution. Others just don't feel comfortable being indoors with any more than a few people. We've designed the Courtyard service and our online service with those people in mind. We want everyone to feel welcome and included!

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SAFETY GUIDELINES:

Seeking to prevent the spread of COVID, the LCPC Session has established these worship guidelines:

- All are encouraged to use hand sanitizer as they enter and exit worship
- All are required to wear masks (except worship leaders on the chancel/stage when reading, speaking, leading singing or playing wind instruments)
- Disposable masks and gloves are available at no charge

- Socializing in circles is prohibited in the Sanctuary building (family groups excepted)
- We sing at all worship services
- We do not offer special programs for children or youth
- We do not have a greeting time during services or a fellowship time between services
- At the 11:00 AM Classic service: the LCPC Choir is on summer hiatus, but various ensembles of singers and musicians will be featured throughout the summer
- We will not offer Communion in public worship until July 19 at the earliest
- An online option will be offered Sunday, July 7, at 6:30 PM (live-streamed on the LCPC Facebook page)
- Bulletins are handed out by ushers
- The offering is collected at all services using baskets on poles (a common practice in many churches!)

• IN THE SANCTUARY:

- Every other pew is blocked off and 6' distancing in seating is required (family groups excepted)
- For an extra measure of safety the back two open pews (north end) are separated by two closed pews
- The swinging doors leading from hallways and Narthex into the Sanctuary are propped open
- On hot days the air conditioning is turned on but the doors are kept open
- The "Cry Room" adjacent to the balcony is available for parents and young children
- A volunteer team cleans and disinfects the Sanctuary, Narthex and Sanctuary area bathrooms between services

• IN THE COURTYARD:

- Chairs are placed 7' apart
- Family clusters in up to four chairs are permitted
- Those worshiping in the Courtyard are required to stop at one of two health stations for a temperature check
- Those with a fever are prevented from entering and special assistance is offered

PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

Martin Luther King, Jr. once said:

"Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about things that matter."

The events of the past few days have shattered our sheltering silence. Maybe this is a good time to ask: Is there something going on in my circle of influence that I need to speak out about?

King also observed:

"The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy."

As the protests morphed into riots all over America, Christians found themselves asking: How does my relationship with the Lord inform and shape my response to discrimination and oppression, and to rage and lawlessness? Am I willing to leave my comfort zone in the service of charity or justice?

It's awesome to live in LA. I'm totally energized by the cultural diversity that we enjoy. But there's one disturbing aspect of that diversity. There's no metro area in the US where there's such a wide division in terms of wealth and opportunity.

And that brings to mind more questions. Will churches like LCPC take up the challenges of caring for the homeless, supporting single parent families, and lifting up kids that have fallen behind? Will we take a stand against authority

structures that reinforce failure and discourage honest effort? Will we share the good news of God's love with those who are living in the shadows?

Our sheltering is winding down. The time of "challenge and controversy" is upon us. Let's commit ourselves once again to our gracious God, who "shows no partiality" (Romans 2:11) and "is able to do infinitely more than all we ask or imagine, according to His power at work within us" (Ephesians 3:20).

HOW'S THE CFC?

The Center for Children ended operations on March 18 and returned to serving families on April 20. A study group of church members was formed to develop financial and employment policies related to Covid-19. Many decisions needed to be made regarding paying staff, furloughs, tuition



payments, loans, and ongoing business decisions. Currently our teachers on staff are working 75% of their regular schedule and getting paid accordingly. Assistants at the Center were furloughed back in April and we hope to bring them back as enrollment grows.

> We started with five children in April and in mid-June we are serving 20 out of our usual 165 children. As you can imagine, even with a PPP loan, finances are tight. Several families have donated in both small and generous amounts to help us through this difficult time. The CFC closes its fiscal year on May 31 and, after not collecting tuition for two

It's clear we are struggling as a nation. We are struggling with the brokenness of the world in the form of a pandemic, but we are also reminded of the power of sin in the form of racism. Just like a disease, sin can show itself in many symp-



toms, some more obvious than others. Racism is one of the more obvious symptoms of this enemy, but the book of Revelation tells us that sin is also woven into the fabric of cultures and structures of our world. Like many of you, I'm profoundly broken by what's going on. I'm trying to listen to the Word of God and listen to the experiences and hurts of my black brothers and sisters. And I've been praying.

Can I be honest? I don't know what I'm doing. I don't know how to lead through a pandemic. I am not an expert in racial reconciliation, and I'm overwhelmed by the depth and complexity of the issues that the church is facing on the road to forgiveness and racial healing. I don't know when there will be a vaccine for Covid-19. I'm not sure what the best policies are for unraveling the power of sin embedded in our culture. I struggle to help my children deal with the stress of an uncertain future. I'm not very good at virtual meetings. I've forgotten how to multiply fractions to help Nate with his homework. It seems like I wake up everyday to new crises that I don't have an answer for. So I pray.

In this practice of prayer, I'm discovering a profoundly difficult lesson: I'm not in control. I never was. I never will be. Control is an illusion created by sin. Prayer reminds me that I am dependent; dependent on my loving Father who never meant for me to bear the burdens I try to carry. Sin says, "You can handle this," but my Father says, "Cast all your cares on me." The truth is, I've failed over and over again. I've modeled self-reliance to my children when I should have been showing them that God's strength is perfected in my weakness. Prayer is the remedy. Real, genuine prayer is the antidote to our illusion of control.

When my son, Carter, first came home from the NICU, he was quite a peaceful baby. He slept a lot. He occasionally would bat at his oxygen tube or swipe at his nasal canula, but he rarely cried. Not when he was hungry (that is a whole other story). Not when he needed a diaper change. In fact, the only thing that could guarantee a long, loud infant wail was the sound of Charlie crying. When she cried, he cried. There were lots of hugs that involved Charlie wrapped in one arm and Carter being held in the other while my ears were ringing.

It did not take long for Charlie to realize the connection and she was so comforted by it. In fact, if something upset her, Carter's cries would quickly settle her down. As her mama, I offered soothing words and Band-Aids and forehead kisses. But I didn't immediately weep when she skinned her knee or broke a toy. Carter did. Now, he was so little that I don't pretend he truly understood what Charlie was crying about. But there was something really touching about how affected he was by her hurt.

Romans 12:15 says: "Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn." Generally, I find it very tempting to rejoice with those who rejoice and offer a sincere apology to those who mourn. Because to actually go into mourning myself would be painful. It would require a breaking down of the walls that guard my heart from the pains of the world that I don't directly experience.

Over the past several weeks, I and I think many others, have become more aware of the deep pain, the suffocating hurt that systemic racism causes on a daily basis. I'm embarrassed by how much my eyes have been opened — by how much I didn't see. And the truth is, I will never really understand that hurt. I can never say: "I've been there. I get it." But, one of the things I can do is mourn with those who mourn.

Jesus is the ultimate example of mourning with those who mourn. He owned our suffering. He took it upon Himself on the cross. And while no one will ever be able to fully follow His holy example, I can begin taking steps towards repentance and towards loving the way that Jesus wants me to love. I can ask God to help me grieve with my black brothers and sisters who are grieving. I can ask Him to lower those heart walls so that I can begin to cry, too; not tears rooted in pity, or even tears rooted in shame, but tears rooted in the love of Christ for my neighbor. It is a start.

Normally, the July *Messenger* article would be all about last minute VBS signups and how we



are getting the chancel decorated and volunteers are preparing for their posts. This year is different. We won't have 200 kids in the Sanctuary shout singing and showing they are much better dancer than I am. And we won't have water games on the basketball court. The need for social distancing has changed all that. But that doesn't mean we won't have VBS! Because of the corona virus, we are going virtual!

This year, we are offering a three-day online VBS experienced called BOIT from July 13-15. There will be three grade level divisions: Preschool and Kindergarten, 1st-3rd grade, and 4th-6th grade. Families will be able to access age-appropriate lesson videos, recorded skits, games, craft instructions and more. To make sure all families have what they need to full enjoy BOIT, Children's Ministries will hand deliver boxes of necessary supplies to homes by July 10. There will also be a Facebook live worship time for kids each morning of VBS and a Zoom party on July 15 at noon. Children will learn about the parable of the sower and the seed, Jesus walking on water, and the calling of the disciples. With each lesson, children will be reminded that

Jesus is wise. Jesus is the best leader. And Jesus saves. While this will be entirely free of charge, parents will have an option to donate upon registering. And registration is open now! NEW SONG WORSHIP (CONTEMPORARY), SUNDAYS AT 9:00 AM SERVICE OF PRAISE (CLASSIC), SUNDAYS AT 11:00 AM

During the Covid-19 crisis, Google searches for "prayer" have skyrocketed. Perhaps they seek out of desperation, perhaps it is out of deep psychological need, or maybe they just have time to reflect on what's important in life. Whatever the reason, people are seeking intimacy with God in increasing numbers, longing for a touch from something or

to worship, sing, pray and seek the Spirit's blessing.

Each day, hikers will be able to choose among 3-4 routes of varying degrees of difficulty, from moderate (4-7 miles) to strenuous (8-14 miles). Besides hiking, we'll offer a couple of road trips to fascinating sites near the highway.

What precautions will we take against COVID? We'll engage in the hygiene practices that have become habitual: social distancing, handwashing, etc. But you need to know that we will be riding in vehicles in groups every day.

One change for 2020 is that the trip will be shorter than previous trips. That makes it less expensive, less tiring and more accessible for fulltime workers. We'll spend all 3 nights of the trip

at the surprisingly refined Motel 6 in Mammoth Lakes. We're offering two lodging options: double rooms or a single room for a higher fee.

The trip is open to anyone going into ninth grade or older, including college students and adults. Families may sign up together. Youth in late elementary school or junior high may participate if they are accompanied by a guardian. Sierra trails can be rugged and east side routes are at high elevations so participants need to be in reasonably good condition.

The fee for Wildlife Tour 2020 will be \$270 for double room occupancy (with two single beds), or \$460 for single room occupancy (availability not guaranteed). It's "first come, first served" and we can only take about 22 people. The registration deadline is Monday, July 13. Watch for registration materials in the Church Office or Student Center.
