# PASTOR'S LETTER



'Tis the season — and don't you just love it?

Round about the third week of November, when the inflatable Santas appear on rooftops and we hear Christmas tunes in every store and restaurant, we all

start fantasizing. We dream of that elusive white Christmas in Montrose. We have visions of sugar plums — plates and platters of deep fried sugar plums with creamy chocolate and caramel centers that are completely lacking in calories. Not even COVID could spoil Christmas.

That said, the season isn't all candy canes and candles. All of us of us experience conflicting emotions this time of year. We feel childish excitement, profound gratitude, and overwhelming love for family members and friends. We're more inclined to give lavish gifts, tell bad jokes, and drink too much

special punch. At the same time, we feel stressed by our cram packed schedules, let down by friends, and maybe envious of their happiness. We feel cut off from our church family and homesick even when we're home. In our darkest moments, we feel disappointed with God, and with the life he has given us.

I love the way Kate Bosher talks about our Christmas longings. (Dr. Bosher taught Classics at Northwestern University.) (Sadly, she died on April 1, 2013, at age 38.)

"Isn't it funny that at Christmas something in you gets so lonely for  $-\mathrm{I}$  don't know what exactly, but it's something that you don't mind so much not having at other times."

Some people think the secret to contentment — or at least to minimizing misery — is to lower your expectations. But that diagnosis is overly simplistic.

Our Christmas disappointments aren't just about spoiled eggnog and political fights at the dinner table. They have much more to do with the fact that the heavenly promises of Christmas are never fulfilled as we would like them to be. We yearn for a world at peace, but the New Year inevitably brings news of another war. The Savior is born, yet we wait and wait for his return. We long to see human hearts changed, but our personal failures and weaknesses persist.

What we're lonely for — what we crave — at this hope-filled time of the year is intimacy with the Lord Jesus. And that loneliness is a gift. It's a message from God's Spirit to our spirits. It's the beginning of the answer to the deep, deep yearning of our hearts.



So we're drawn once again to our Emmanuel – God made flesh, lying in a manger. We're reminded once again of those glorious promises. As we surrender our lives to the Lord, we discover a peace we've never known, a peace that no setback — no war — no pandemic can take away from us. As we tune our hearts to his heart, we experience a joy, the durable kind of joy proclaimed by the angels — joy that isn't dependent on circumstances — joy that comes from walking with our gracious God and bringing glory to him.

# LEE'S LATEST

"And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." (Colossians 3:17)

Thanksgiving is the Jan Brady of Holidays — caught in the middle of Halloween and Christmas! KOST 103.5 is already playing Christmas music just four days after Halloween. I acknowledge the difficult historic al realities of the settlement of the Americas, but to just gloss over the one day a year when we focus on gratitude does seem to be throwing the baby out with the bathwater.

Paul makes gratitude one of the centerpieces of his theology. Gratitude should be the default setting of our hearts — it acknowledges that all good things come from God and understands that God is God and we are not. But beyond the theological truth of thanksgiving, it is one of the most important disciplines we can use to shape our hearts and minds. Neuroscientists and psychologists have studied the physical changes that happen in our brains when we practice sustained, disciplined gratitude. It rewires our brains to experience greater joy and less anxiety.

I hope this year of all years you make gratitude a habit. Amid all the stress, anxiety, and depression that our culture is experiencing, it's vital that we learn and practice the art of thanksgiving in



all that we do, whether in word or deed


# Light A Candle Foundation Update



Last year's Project Dominicana Medical team worked with the Light A Candle Foundation, an organization founded and run by Haitian Dominicans. LAC aims to empower people living in poverty in the DR through health education and health promotion. LAC staff serve people living in the bateys (small villages where sugar cane cutters and their families live). During the pandemic, the LAC network has also been able to provide emergency aid by distributing food packets to people living in barrios and bateys. High unemployment means poor people are facing starvation. Many churches in the USA including LCPC have helped fund this outreach.

# children's Ministylicks tries

There were some days this year I didn't know if we'd make it to December. But time keeps marching forward, and now we're finally at the most magical time of the year. And with December comes Christmas, and with Christmas, Advent, my favorite liturgical season!

Those of you who aren't "high church" people might not have a favorite liturgical season. (Most people don't!) But especially around the holidays, I crave tradition, and I love looking through church history to find traditions that make me feel more connected to the Christians who came before me. One of those traditions is Advent. Now, you might guess that Advent is my favorite because of the themes of hope, faith, joy, and peace. (Or maybe because of the chocolate advent calendars!) And I do love those themes...and chocolate!

But Advent is actually my favorite because it is a tiny example of what we face all the time as Christians. To me, Advent is about waiting for something that we know is going to happen, but hasn't happened yet. It's about the tension between the imperfect world we live in now and the perfect world to come — the already, but not yet, of the Kingdom. When we lean into the waiting at Advent, we recognize that the world is a broken place. And yet, we aren't without hope. Jesus already came!

And He will come again! But in the meantime there is pain and brokenness. And observing Advent gives us a time to recognize that pain and brokenness while we wait for the world to be made new.

I think the impulse in the modern American church is to skip straight to the joy. I understand that impulse. The world is hard, and I love a good Christmas cookie and Christmas lights as much as the next person! But I love Advent because it reminds me that the Church is with me in the waiting and longing. Jesus knows those feelings, and we don't have to ignore them or pretend like everything is okay. And the last few years as I've been more intentional about observing Advent, the celebration at Christmas is even sweeter. I'm not saying that you shouldn't wear an ugly sweater or put up decorations until December 24, but I would encourage you to remember as you prepare for Christmas that Jesus knows the pain of an imperfect world. Advent is a time to both long for a better future, and celebrate the fact that Jesus has already come!

If you're looking for some ways to celebrate Advent and Christmas as a family, have no fear! Parents should have already received a packet with Advent activities via email the weekend after Thanksgiving, And December's Family Faith Box will have plenty of Christmas activities as we learn about the Christmas story and the birth of Jesus. Finally, we are going to be hosting a virtual event called "Dough Holy Night," put on by the same company we used for this summer's Bolt VBS. This will consist of families spending a night at home together as a video walks them through baking some delicious cookies and learning the true meaning of Christmas. We're encouraging as many families as possible to do this on Friday, December 11, but if you're busy that night, the video will be up for the entire month of December. # Health Policy

As we run headlong into our normal cold and flu season I want to remind you of our revised health care policy. As I have said, it will take all of us to keep the CFC open and serving families.

- If anyone at the Center for Children shows COVID-19 symptoms, during the day, we will isolate the symptomatic person and send them home as soon as possible.
- We shall contact local Department of Public Health and follow their instructions on cleaning, closure and notifications.
- When signing in, both the drop-off person's and the child's temperature will be checked with a no-touch thermometer. If the child or drop off person that has a 100+ temp the child will not be accepted. We ask you to be honest with

any fever-reducing medication your child may

have taken. We will also be looking for coughs, runny noses and other signs of illness. Children with symptoms will be excluded from our program for 72 hours symptom free without the use of medicine or if in the opinion of the administrative staff the symptoms are related to COVID-19 we will require a medical clearance before the return to the CFC; this will included one of the following: a negative test, 14-day isolation free of symptoms or an alternative diagnosis from a doctor's office.

- We require that you notify us if anyone in your household is currently or becomes sick.
- The same health screenings will also occur for each teacher/staff member.
- These policies are in place to help stop the spread of the COVID-19 virus.

We are pleased to announce that enough funds were raised in our fall fundraiser to purchase air purifiers for all classrooms. They have been ordered and should be in the classrooms soon.
