Dear friends, Unless you're new to LCPC you probably know that we've been concerned for some time now about the wonderful stained glass

windows in the Sanctuary. The two round stained glass windows on the north and south walls are in excellent condition — the steel structures in and around them are extremely sturdy. But the eight rectangular windows on the east and west walls need attention.

Below I'm going to tell you about the refurbishing work that is planned for the windows in early 2020. I'm also going to invite you to help us with that work. But first an interesting bit of history.

In the early 1950s, the LCPC Session commissioned John Harrison Wallis of Pasadena to design the eight east and west windows in conjunction with the construction of the Sanctuary. Unfortunately, financial considerations prevented the church from having them built and installed. When the Sanctuary was dedicated in 1953, all the panes in the eight windows were of clear glass.

In the mid-1980s, John Harrison Wallis contacted the church. "If you want to have those windows built," he explained, "you need to act soon because I'm in my 80s." Although the church didn't have the funds to complete the work, the Session took a big step of faith. The work was commissioned, a capital campaign was launched, the congregation responded generously, and in 1986 the windows were installed and paid for.

As you've probably noticed, the windows depict dozens of stories and scenes from the Bible. Look towards the dawn and you're peering into the Old Testament. Look towards the sunset and you're exposed to the light of New Testament. The windows inspire us as we worship and reflect on the Lord's mighty works. More than that, the 10 large LCPC windows are a cultural treasure trove. Admittedly I'm biased, but I regard them as the most beautiful works of art in the Crescenta Valley.

So then, what's wrong with the eight windows? What's our plan to refurbish and protect them?

The windows are not on the verge of collapsing in a heap, but the problems we're facing are significant. The putty that seals each pane into the steel window frames is cracking and falling out. Every week we collect chunks of putty that have fallen on the floor or the pews. In part because of this problem, the panes within the rigid steel frames are starting to buckle. You don't notice that problem from inside the Sanctuary, but from outside, up close, it's obvious that many of the panes are bowing inward or outward. All of these problems are exacerbated by the fact that when rain pelts



the windows water seeps into the window frames, weakening the putty.

The team charged with addressing these problems has done a great deal of research. After interviewing and seeking bids from three different companies that specialize in stained glass work, the Property Committee and Session decided in December to hire Judson Studios of Highland Park to refurbish the windows. Judson is the oldest and largest glass studio in the West. Their work will include removing old putty, resealing and waterproofing the windows, re-installing them with silicone, and installing unobtrusive, clear Lexan covers outside each window. (Lexan is a high tech plastic that doesn't yellow.) We don't yet know the full cost, but it will be less than \$100,000. The work will begin early this month and will take up to two months to complete.

I'm confident that this work will accomplish the main goal of refurbishing the windows and protecting them for many decades to come – certainly more than the three decades that have transpired since the windows were first installed.

How will we pay for the work?

In line with the plans establish by the Session about a year ago in the Vision 2020 plan, we will be conducting a dollar for dollar matching gift campaign. How will it work? For every dollar that is donated towards the work, a dollar will be released from the estate money that has been received by LCPC. The campaign will be launched with a mailing to everyone this month. We hope to receive the funds needed (50% from the congregation and 50% from the estate fund) by the end of March and to finish up by the end of June of 2020.

We currently have more than enough money in estate funds to pay for the window work. It's reasonable to ask therefore: Why are we conducting this campaign? Really for two reasons. First and foremost, because there are several other big, important, "pro-growth" Vision 2020 projects that we can move ahead on only if we use some of the estate money. Some of those projects will have to cancelled if we don't have help with the window project. Second, we believe many in the church family will want to participate by adopting a window pane (or two or three!). You'll hear more about that later.

With the Lord's help, in the Spirit's strength, we're making good progress with our Vision 2020 goals. I'm excited to see the good work God is going to accomplish in us in the year ahead.
