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PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends, Have you been thinking about going to the Dominican Republic with LCPC from June 13-22 to engage in mission

work, or sending your child or grandchild? If so, please read these testimonies by two DR veterans. Even if you personally don't feel called to overseas outreach, I hope you'll read them and see how the Holy Spirit is moving at LCPC.

Last January, Judy Trumbo told us in worship that the eight (or so) trips she has been a part of have been "a revelation."

"If I can go on our annual mission trip to the Dominican Republic so can you. I wasn't the most likely candidate when I started out... a mom of teens and preteens — didn't speak Spanish — still don't; rather anxiety prone; not a doctor; hardly ever hammered a nail.

You begin meeting the people, and you visit your first batey — a small, very poor village out in the midst of the cane fields. People live there without running water, or indoor plumbing, often with swept hard-packed dirt for floors. Our youth begin playing with the kids of the batey, jumping rope, throwing a ball.

You go to church, the church that we — LCPC — helped build! And there you witness a depth of feeling and faith that for me was a new experience. These people — you feel it in your bones — depend on that faith to get them through every day. I go back time and again, not so much for what I can offer, but for what the people there teach me about trust and faith.

Virtually everyone — including my own kids — comes back blown away by what they have experienced — seeing these people who have so little, yet are living out their lives without bitterness, trusting in God. The young folks will primarily be building a house for a family in the barrio we work in, but each one has the opportunity to help the medical team in the bateys for a day.

If you are a doctor, nurse, or dentist and you go, you just may inspire a teen to pursue medicine — to say nothing of what it means for the patients that will be treated by you. Every year we especially pray for medical professionals to join the tour. [This year] some physical therapy students from Azusa Pacific will join us.

Consider coming to see what God may have in store for you. You too may find yourself going back again and again."

Here's part of the testimony offered by high school senior Katie Hayhurst at the Youth Sunday service in January.

"As a part of this church, I've always heard of Project Dominicana as my brother Andrew went in 2010 and my sister Emily went in 2014. For the longest time, I felt that going to the DR was more of something I had to do because my siblings had done it.

As soon as my junior year rolled around, my mom reminded me that that summer would be my best chance to go on the trip. But leading up to the actual trip, I was so busy with marching band rehearsals, practicing for violin recordings. my first AP classes, the SATs, and figuring out what colleges I wanted to apply to that I never made time to pray about the trip or think about it outside of the mandatory meetings. I had failed to get myself in the right mindset. In fact, by the time I

was on the plane to the DR, I realized that I hardly had a relationship with God.

Although I was surrounded by sentimental prayers and worship sessions, the connection to God just wasn't there. I was still happy to be a part of the construction team and to help change a family's life. However, I felt distant from the reason everyone else on the team was there: to show God's love.

Thankfully, my perspective of God's personal role with me completely changed as soon as I did my first bit of construction. You must understand that I had absolutely no construction experience let alone physical endurance going into the mission trip. You see, I got my high school PE credit from playing an instrument in a marching band that doesn't march. So you could say it's kinda unbelievable that I was able to swing a hammer, standing on tall ladders, in hot and humid weather, for three to four hours straight without passing out!

Despite that sounding less than enthralling, those hours of nailing wooden planks were the highlight of the trip for me. Looking around at the intense teamwork of our construction team was astonishing. With our mini teams each with their own separate goals, I realized just how important God was in bringing all of us together. There was no way we could have been as productive as we were without the grace of God. I have never felt more needed by God. From the top of that wobbly

ladder, it would have been impossible to ignore God's presence.

I was completely lost as I had had my priorities all over the place before the mission trip. I had let my junior year stress cover up what was truly important — my relationship with God. It wasn't until I was hammering from a wobbly ladder that I had the realization that God's role for me is bigger than standardized



tests or my GPA. Just as the prodigal son's father held his arms open in celebration for his son's return, God's presence made me feel worthwhile and welcomed back as his child."

LEE'S LATEST

"Abram believed the LORD, and he credited it to him as righteousness." (Genesis 15:6)

This is one of the most important verses in the Bible. It sets the stage for Israel's journey with God. Paul and James both quote this



verse in their letters. It was the rallying cry for Martin Luther and John Calvin during the Protestant Reformation. But what does it mean?

The word for believed is the word from which we get our word "Amen." Its core meaning is to be firm, secure, or steadfast. Ultimately, Abram reckoned God to be reliable and God reckoned Abram to be righteous. Faith is not just believing something unbelievable. Faith is the obedience that comes from believing God is reliable. When we are obedient to God, we show that we believe God is who He says He is: trustworthy, reliable, faithful, and above all, good.

Abram wasn't perfect. He didn't always do the right thing. But Abram lived his life, as best as he could, in the belief that God was good and trustworthy, and because of this, God reckoned him righteous.

As a child, I didn't know anything about Lent and even as a teenager, my understanding was very limited. Lent seemed like a time when people gave up stuff like ice cream and soda. I would like our kids to have a better understanding of this season in the Christian calendar, but I also think it is important to keep it simple. So when talking to children about Lent, I like to describe it as a time of getting ready

When we're taking a big trip, we take time to get ready — to research, save, pack — so that we can best enjoy the experience. During Lent, we get our hearts and minds ready so that we can best understand and celebrate the redeeming work of Jesus Christ. And one way to do that is to focus on the two F's: "Fast and Follow." (Now for little ones, it is important to explain that "fast" doesn't mean "be speedy" — which they already are!)

People in the Bible fasted from food and focused on being filled with God instead of bread and meat and fruits and veggies. When we fast, we can give up a meal or a kind of food or we can give up something that takes up our time and/or focus — like TV or Facebook or Youtube or FortNite.

Jesus gave up everything for us, so when we give up something, we get the slightest taste of loving sacrifice. That fasting can lead to following — meaning we replace what we have given up with something that helps us grow closer to our Savior.

For example, I knew a family who every year gave up certain TV programs each week and during that time they would pray together, read the Bible, or even listen to worship music while playing board games. Fasting and Following will look different for each person who tries it. That said, there is something beautiful and unifying about the family of Christ simultaneously striving to better understand the work of Christ and show Him our love and gratitude.

Following our "What is Lent?" PEAK event in February, Children's Ministries will continue talking about the idea of fasting and following throughout the month of March and begin reading about Jesus' last days before the crucifixion. Lastly, we will also be collecting art throughout the season of Lent for our Second Annual Easter Art Gallery.

Last year, children ages 2 through 12 used vi-

sual arts as a way to share what they were learning or how they felt about the true meaning of Easter. As a result, the Narthex was full of construction paper crosses, water color sunrises, real flowers, collage butterflies, and more. Children's Ministries aims to teach children that worship comes in many forms.

The act of creating can be worshipful just like we can be moved to worship when we appreciate the art of others. Children who want to participate in the Easter Art Gallery simply need to submit their piece of art to Ashley Pollock or Kristy Hicks any time before Good Friday on April 10.

Lent has started in the Christian calendar. Many people think of the Roman Catholic Church when Lent is spoken of, but it is not just a Catholic tradition. On February 26, LCPC held an Ash Wednesday service that included putting ashes on our foreheads, again something most people only think of as a Catholic tradition. During Lent, people often give up something are meat, candy, soda, TV, social media, etc.

One time a clever boy on a week-long junior high trip told the advisers he had given up eating anything green — he was avoiding vegetables. Other people take on something during Lent as a way to show Christ's vision of servanthood. I have seen people commit to polishing the church pews, serving the homeless, picking up trash, etc. At one church I worked at there were no business meetings during Lent. Committees met to pray not conduct business. This caused me to be very disciplined in making sure anything I needed approved

This was a program not just for the Presbyterian Church, but for many protestant churches where money was raised for international causes. I can still remember doing extra chores at my house and my grandparents' house to earn money for this special offering.

While these are some of the things that people do during Lent, what does Lent represent? It is a time of reflection preparing us for Easter. The 40 days of Lent remind us Jesus time in the desert and His sacrifice. Regardless of your families religious affiliation or traditions, take this month to talk to your kids about giving back and service. It's not just a Christmas thing! We would love to hear your stories of giving and service.
