Dear friends, In the "Journey With Iesus" group that I lead on Wednesday evenings, we recently explored what it means to be called and sent. I reminded our

circle that our wonderful God is a missionary. (The word "missions" actually means "sending.") He's a God who calls and sends:

- He calls and sends Abram (later renamed Abraham) to a new land to establish a new spiritual family.
- He calls and sends that family, Israel, to be a blessing to the nations.
- He calls and sends Moses to lead his enslaved people out of Egypt.
- He calls and sends his only begotten Son Jesus to take away sin and establish God's reign.
- Jesus calls and sends his disciples out to heal the sick and proclaim the coming of God's Kingdom.
- After Jesus' ascension, the Father and the Son send the Holy Spirit to the Church.
- And the Holy Spirit then calls and sends the Church onto the mission field to continue the work that Jesus began.

Like the Blues Brothers, all Christians are "on a mission from God."

That last point was the key theme of last month's all-church retreat. We all agreed that the challenges we face often seem daunting. Here in La La Land we're working on hard ground. But, as I reminded everyone at our closing worship service, we take heart in the promises of God. The harvest

has already been prepared. Moreover, we go out in the power of the Spirit. So we can be sure God's fire will fall when we respond to his call!

During our time in Big Bear, we soaked up a lot of good teaching from Doug Schaupp. Doug heads up evangelism for InterVarsity Christian Fellowship. One insight he offered was that in the Gospels we don't see Jesus conducting "question and answer" sessions. He mostly conducts "question and question" sessions. He inspires and provokes interest in the Kingdom by asking questions that penetrate people's hearts.

A related insight was that to influence people and nudge them closer to the Lord, we need to be curiosity stokers. We need to inspire and invigorate people to think in new ways about the things of God.

I think the most important insight came when Doug conducted a simple show-of-hands survey. He outlined four skills or strengths that are essential in bringing people to Christ. Among the 120 or so that were present, about 1/3 of us raised our hand for each of the first three choices. Only one person raised his hand for the final choice — the one that involves "closing the deal" by inviting a person to make a decision to repent and receive Jesus as Lord and Savior.

I wasn't surprised at that result. It confirmed what many of us already know about LCPC. We're strong in many areas of discipleship. We love it when new people join us, and we want to our friends and neighbors who don't know the Lord to encounter him and receive new life in his name. But we're not good at closing the deal. Even when people seem ripe and ready for the harvest, we just don't know how to follow through.

The good news is that we were bothered by those survey results. In our small group gatherings at the retreat people said things like this: "We're a missions church! We all need to get better at this!" By the end of Saturday evening it was very clear that most of us were motivated to change and grow.

In short, we left Big Bear determined to be more prayerful, more deliberate, and more courageous in our witness for Christ.

May the Spirit throw fuel on the fire that was sparked in Big Bear. May He fill us with love for those who don't know the Lord and make us more determined each day to bring others with us into the Kingdom.
